Will Head Cornell Cadet Regiment Next Year - Other Officers Appointed For Two Classes Which Will Drill in 1916-17.

With two classes taking drill next year and about 1,000 additional men being trained by the department of military science and tactics, a much larger staff of officers will be used than in the past.

The new army when completed will accommodate two battalions so that in the winter it will not be necessary to have theoretical work and lectures more than one day in every two weeks.

Interlaken, June 5.—The remains of Alfred B. Hause, who died in New York City Friday evening, at the age of 59 years, were brought to his former home in Ovid, yesterday morning, for burial.

Mr. Hause went to his office last Friday morning in his usual good health. He was taken with an attack of dizziness, from which he never recovered, but died within five hours.

The Rev. William Jacques who has been seriously ill is improved.

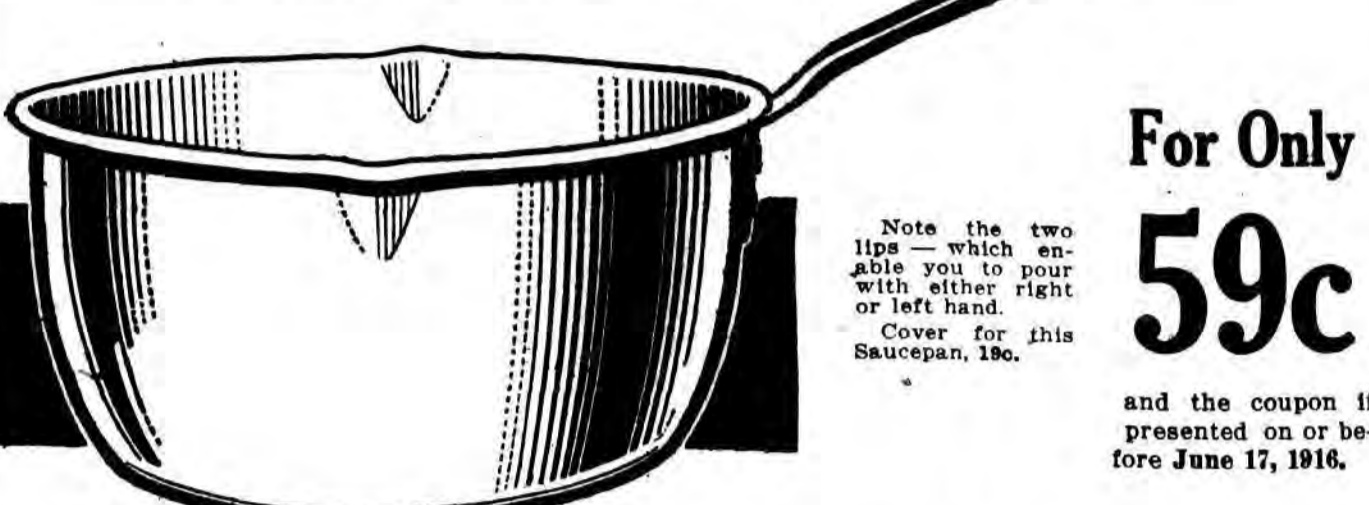
