On this twenty eighth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty eight personally appeared before the Court of Common Pleas held in and for the said County Polly Hetchum a resident of the town of Warwick in the County of Orange and State of New York aged eighty five years who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefits of the provisions made by the act of Congress passed July 4, 1836 that she is the widow of Nathaniel Hetchum who was a Lieutenant in <sup>the</sup> John Jacksons Company in Colonel John Hathorns Regiment of Militia when he went out into the service of the United States in the militia as hereinafter stated

That the first time her husband the said Nathaniel Hetchum was called into the service of the United States was in the month of June or July in the year one thousand seven hundred and seventy six as a Lieutenant in Captain John Jacksons Company she cannot state the Regiment that her said husband left his residence in the town of Warwick afterwards to go to Long Island that ~~he~~ <sup>he</sup> ~~resided~~ <sup>resided</sup> there for five months and that he was absent for that term of five months that he stated when he come home that he was in the American Army on Long Island and retreated to Brooklyn heights from that to New York and from there to Kings bridge and from there to White Plains before the British Army when the British Army captured New York

That her said husband next service that she can recollect in the Army of the United States during the Revolutionary war was as a Lieutenant but she cannot recollect his Captain or any of his officers or where he was stationed <sup>at about the year 1776 in the</sup> but she recollect that he was in the American <sup>Army</sup> on the last mentioned occasion for the term of two months that she believes her husband served in the American <sup>Army</sup> on several other occasions but

from the great length of time and the consequent loss of memory  
she cannot state the times or place -

She further declares that she was married to the said  
Nathaniel Kitchum on the twenty sixth day of May in the  
Year one thousand seven hundred and seventy three that her  
husband the ~~said~~ Nathaniel Kitchum died in the ninth  
day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and  
twenty seven and that she has remained a widow ever  
since that period - that she was married to the said Nathaniel  
Kitchum at the time above stated by the Reverend Nathaniel  
Hart a Presbyterian Clergyman at the house of said Nathaniel  
Kitchum <sup>in the town of Northampton County of Orange</sup> but she has never had a Certificate of her marriage  
that said Nathaniel Hart has been dead several years that  
she lived with the said Nathaniel Kitchum from the time  
of their marriage up to the time his death as above stated  
as will more fully appear by reference to affidavits & proof  
hereto annexed that Polly Dolsen widow of Isaac Dolsen is  
the only person living who says she was present at her marriage

Tours of duty of Lieutenant Ketchum was such at Minisinks  
in the winter and about ten days in each tour of  
duty as last mentioned deponent was a private in Captain  
Wood's Company and Lieutenant Ketchum was in Captain  
Menters Company but is not certain that Captain Menters  
was there but thinks he was. that these tours at Minisinks  
was before & after the Minisinks battle

That deponent was out with Lieutenant Ketchum on  
various other occasions that this deponent cannot detail  
and further deponent saith not

Orange County ss. Samuel Fitcham being duly sworn saith that he is aged almost eighty one ~~years~~ that he is a Brother to Nathaniel Fitcham <sup>deceased</sup> that some time since he made an affidavit to the request of Polly Fitcham the widow of said ~~Nathaniel~~ Nathaniel Fitcham that this deponent then stated that the said Nathaniel Fitcham tested as a Lieutenant in Captain Jacksons Company in Col M<sup>c</sup>Dougals Regiment and his now Son and is confident that the said Nathaniel Fitcham tested as a Lieutenant in Captain Jacksons Company and served five months in the summer of 1776 commencing his service on Long Island retreated to New York Kings bridge from there to White Plains and was discharged after the battle at White Plains that Capt Jackson was either sick or something was the matter that was not with the army some said he feigned his disease George Kern was the second Lieutenant of the same Company and like Capt Jackson left the Company during the whole or the greater part of that enlistment and whether any other Captain was placed over Lieutenant Fitcham this deponent does not know but he is sure that Lieutenant Fitcham had the Command of said Company when the Army retreated from Brooklyn to New York and this deponent verily believes that Col M<sup>c</sup>Dougal Commanded the Regiment but may be mistaken as to the Colonel

That in the year 1777 Lieutenant Fitcham performed a tour of duty in Captain Minthens Company of Matotins that they were at Rumsapo and ordered to March to the North and he thinks had got to New Windsor or Little Britain when he heard that Bergoens army was taken that about that time a quantity of Arms and military Stores arrived from

Ordered that Captain Mentions Company was ordered  
with others to guard the same to Easton in the  
State of Pennsylvania that in this tour of duty de-  
ponent thinks they were out about three months  
Major Roppin & Col John Keethon Commanding and  
went with the guard to Easton that Lieutenant  
Ketchum was out during the whole of this tour  
that deponent belonged to the same company

In the year 1779 this deponent was ordered out in Capt  
Mentions Company of the 1st Lieutenant Nathaniel Ketchum  
Col John Keethons Regiment and went to West Point was  
there when when General Mays left to capture Stony Point  
and after the capture of that post by Genl Mays  
Col Keethons Regiment was ordered down the Hudson  
River to Havens town and was out in this tour about  
two months Lieutenant Ketchum served the whole tour  
and further said not



REVOLUTIONARY CLAIM.

I certify that, in conformity with the law of the United States, of the 4<sup>th</sup> July 1836

Polly Ketchum deceased, of New York, widow of Nathaniel Ketchum deceased, who was a Lieutenant in the Revolution was entitled to receive Ninety nine dollars and ten cents per annum commencing on the 1<sup>st</sup> March 1831 and having died on the 11<sup>th</sup> September eighteen hundred & thirty nine the amount due up to that date is payable to Azubah Ketchum, Temperance Ketchum, Gill Ketchum, ~~Arthur Ketchum~~, ~~Hariz Ketchum~~, and Abijah Ketchum; only surviving children of Polly Ketchum deceased, increased from \$83.56. Former payments to be deducted.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter of April 11, 1940, in which you request information relative to Revolutionary War soldiers, Isaac Caril Ketchum, Ketcham or Ketchum, and Nathaniel Ketcham, Ketcham or Ketchum.

The Revolutionary War records of this office fail to afford any information relative to an Isaac or Caril Ketchum, searched under all spellings of the surname.

The data which follow were taken from papers on file in the pension claim, W.20310, based on the military service of the only Nathaniel Ketchum (searched under all spellings of the surname) that is found in the Revolutionary War records of this office.

The date and place of birth of Nathaniel Ketchum and the names of his parents are not shown.

While living in Warwick, Orange County, New York, Nathaniel Ketchum served as first lieutenant with the New York troops as follows: from about the first of March, 1776, four months under Captain John Wisner and was stationed at Fort Constitution; from June or July, 1776, five months under Captain John Jackson and Colonel William Allison; in the winter of 1777, three months under Colonel William Allison; from about September, 1777, about three months under Captain John Minthorn and Colonel John Hathorn; in the fall of 1778, about one month and ten days under Captain Minthorn and Colonel Hathorn; from about the last of September, 1779, about two months under Captain Minthorn and Colonel John Hathorn.

Nathaniel Ketchum died December 9, 1827.

This officer married in Goshen, Orange County, New York, May 26, 1773, Polly Drake.

As the widow of Nathaniel Ketchum, Polly Ketchum (her personal signature Ketchum) was allowed pension on her application executed May 28, 1838, at which time she was living in Warwick, New York, aged eighty-five years.

Polly Ketchum died September 4 or 11, 1838, and was survived by the following children: Asubah Ketchum, Temperance, Dill, Esther Haize or Hauze and Abia or Abijah Ketchum. —?

In 1838, reference was made to the widow's grandchildren but no names were given.

The widow had a brother, Joshua Drake, and the soldier had a brother Ezra Ketchum ~~but both were dead~~ in 1838. In that year the soldier's brother, Samuel Ketchum, was living in Warwick, New York, aged about eighty-one years.

There are no further data relative to family.
